Per your request, staff has reviewed the two locations under NNEPRA's consideration to construct a new Downeaster layover facility with regard to their consistency with the Brunswick's 2008 Comprehensive Plan. The two locations are 2 Turner Street (Map U23, Parcel 93 and Map U26, Parcel 15) and 22 Old Bath Road (Map 45, Parcel 1C).

The overall expansion of Amtrak passenger service is consistent with the policies and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan, specifically Part B. General Pattern of Development and Policy Area 8, Promote a Diverse and Healthy Local Economy. Part B reflects upon the guiding principles for Brunswick's general pattern of development. One such principle states that neighborhood livability should be enhanced. Where those neighborhoods are adjacent to mixed use or commercial/industrial areas, "any impacts of development should be mitigated through a variety of methods. The impacts to the areas immediately surrounding proposed new development must be balanced against the overall benefits of a project to the community including efficient municipal services, the need for compact growth to protect rural landscapes, and its economic contribution to the community."

Policy 8 vision/desired future condition is clear in its intent that the Town will "actively pursue infill development that redevelops underutilized, abandoned, and/or brownfield/grayfield land and buildings within the growth zone." Furthermore, Objective #6, Promote expansion of passenger and freight rail service in Brunswick, lists one action – to "coordinate with MDOT, the Northern New England Passenger Rail Authority and federal authorities to implement the infrastructure improvements needed for rail service." With Brunswick proposed as the eastern terminus of the Downeaster, the construction of a train layover facility is consistent with what is considered infrastructure improvements needed for rail service and will economically contribute to the community. Therefore, it is staff's determination that the project is consistent with the 2008 Comprehensive Plan.

Consistency with land use area recommendations of the Comprehensive Plan is as follows for each site:

2 Turner Street (Map U23, Parcel 93; Map U26, Parcel 15)

The combined parcels of ~8.06 acres are located along the north side of the existing rail corridor between Stanwood Street and Church Road and presently owned by the Maine Central Railroad Company. This area is located within the Commercial Connectors land use area (currently zoned areas of Highway Commercial 1 and 2, and Mixed Use 2 – Intown Railroad Corridor) west of Stanwood Street. The established vision for this area is to remain commercial with improved access, building design and streetscape through future redevelopment. Residential uses are discouraged and alternative connector access is considered along the railroad corridor. Uses include a wide range of non-residential and currently permitted industrial uses. The proposed train layover facility is currently a permitted industrial use within the MU2 District. Based upon the stated vision for the Commercial Connectors and desired uses, it is staff's determination that the use of this site for the train layover facility would be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The larger scale of the facility, to totally house 3 train sets in a climate-controlled structure during servicing, is outweighed by the resultant increased buffering of noise, lighting and fumes for the adjacent residential area.

22 Old Bath Road (Map 45, Parcel 1C)

This 16.5 acre parcel is also located along the north side of the existing rail corridor east of Old Bath Road and privately owned. The parcel is located within the Cook's Corner Commercial Hub land use area (partial area of Cook's Corner Zoning District). The established vision for this area is to become a vibrant mixed-use area per the Cook's Corner Master Plan, to serve as a regional commercial center with new residential development and connections to adjacent existing neighborhoods. Uses include a wide range of residential and primarily retail and consumer uses, offices and public/community uses. The overall intent is to maximize development potential and continue to enhance the Cook's Corner Commercial Area. Clearly, the Cook's Corner Commercial Hub is envisioned to be a more intensive retail/residential mixed use area. Current zoning allows for industrial use by special permit only. Cook's Corner Design Standards would also apply. It is staff's determination that the use of this parcel as the train layover facility would not be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan nor the Cook's Corner Master Plan.



This standard form is provided in response to your request for information regarding the presence and distribution of essential fish habitat (EFH) and fishery resources in the vicinity of your proposed action.

Essential Fish Habitat

A complete list of species and life stages for which EFH has been designated can be found on the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) Habitat Conservation Division website at: http://www.nero.noaa.gov/hcd/webintro.html. The website also contains information on descriptions of EFH for each species, guidance on the EFH consultation process including EFH assessments, and information relevant to other NMFS mandates.

The Magnuson-Stevens Fisheries Conservation and Management Act (MSA) and the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act (FWCA) require federal agencies to consult with the NMFS on their proposed activities. Insofar as a project involves EFH, this process is guided by the requirements of our EFH regulations at 50 CFR 600.905, which mandates the preparation of EFH assessments and generally outlines each agency's obligations in this consultation procedure.

The required contents of an EFH assessment include: 1) a description of the action; 2) an analysis of the potential adverse effects of the action on EFH and the managed species; 3) the federal agency's conclusion regarding the effects of the action on EFH; and 4) proposed mitigation, if applicable. Other information that should be contained in the EFH assessment, if appropriate, includes: 1) the results of on-site inspections to evaluate the habitat and site-specific effects; 2) the views of recognized experts on the habitat or the species that may be affected; 3) a review of pertinent literature and related information; and 4) an analysis of alternatives to the action that could avoid or minimize the adverse effects on EFH. Upon submittal of an EFH assessment by the federal action agency, the NMFS will provide conservation recommendations for the proposed project, as necessary.

Protected Species

Information regarding the Endangered Species Act or Marine Mammal Protection Act will be provided under separate cover from the NMFS Protected Resources Division. 





Thank you for your letter dated April 16, 2012, requesting information or recommendations from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service). This letter provides the Service's response pursuant to section 7 of the Endangered Species Act (ESA), as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531-1543), the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (16 U.S.C. 668-668d, 54 Stat. 250), and the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act, as amended (16 U.S.C. 661-667d).

Federally Listed Species

Atlantic salmon

This project occurs within the range of the Gulf of Maine Distinct Population Segment (GOM DPS) of Atlantic salmon (*Salmo salar*) in Maine, a federally-endangered species under the joint jurisdiction of the Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) (74 FR 29344; June 19, 2009). The Atlantic salmon GOM DPS encompasses all naturally spawned and conservation hatchery populations of anadromous Atlantic salmon whose freshwater range occurs in the watersheds from the Androscoggin River northward along the Maine coast to the Dennys River and wherever these fish occur in the estuarine and marine environment. Also included in the GOM DPS are all associated conservation hatchery populations used to supplement these natural populations. Excluded are landlocked Atlantic salmon and those salmon raised in commercial hatcheries for aquaculture.

The proposed project site also occurs within a HUC-10 watershed (Little Androscoggin River) that has been designated as critical habitat for Atlantic salmon by NMFS (74 FR 39907; August

10, 2009). Critical habitat is designated to include all perennial rivers, streams, and estuaries and lakes connected to the marine environment within the designated watershed.

For Atlantic salmon and its critical habitat, NMFS and the Service share consultation responsibilities under section 7 of the ESA. The Service generally handles projects in the freshwater component of the salmon's habitat and NMFS handles projects in the marine and estuarine environment (generally below the head of tide).

Please note that under section 7 of the ESA, it is the federal action agency's responsibility to determine if a project may affect a federally listed species. For example, if the project receives federal funding or needs a federal permit, those actions may provide a "nexus" for section 7 consultation under the ESA. If the federal action agency determines that a project would have "no effect" on a listed species or critical habitat, they do not need to seek the concurrence of the Service and there is no need for section 7 consultation. If the federal agency determines that a project "may affect" a listed species or its critical habitat, then consultation pursuant to section 7 of the ESA should be initiated. Please note, however, that there is no provision under section 7 for consultation after a project has already been completed.

Based on the information currently available to us, no other federally-listed species under the jurisdiction of the Service are known to occur in the project area.

Other Protected Species

Bald and golden eagles

Occasional, transient bald eagles may occur in the general project area. The bald eagle was removed from the federal threatened list on August 9, 2007 and is now protected from take under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. "Take" means to pursue, shoot, shoot at, poison, wound, kill, capture, trap, collect, molest or disturb. The term "disturb" under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act was recently defined within a final rule published in the Federal Register on June 5, 2007 (72 FR 31332). "Disturb" means to agitate or bother a bald or golden eagle to a degree that causes, or is likely to cause, based on the best scientific information available, 1) injury to an eagle; 2) a decrease in its productivity, by substantially interfering with normal breeding, feeding, or sheltering behavior.

http://www.fws.gov/migratorybirds/issues/BaldEagle/NationalBaldEagleManagementGuidelines .pdf. These Guidelines are voluntary and were prepared to help landowners, land managers and others meet the intent of the Eagle Act and avoid disturbing bald eagles. If you believe this project will result in taking or disturbing bald or golden eagles, please contact our office for further guidance. We encourage early and frequent consultations to avoid take of eagles.

¹ section 7 consultation, however, is only necessary when a federal agency takes a *discretionary* action (e.g., an agency has a choice of whether or not to fund or permit a particular project).



Dear Ms. West:

I have searched the Natural Areas Program's Biological and Conservation Data System files in response to your request received April 18, 2012 for information on the presence of rare or unique botanical features documented from the vicinity of the project site in Brunswick, Maine. Rare and unique botanical features include the habitat of rare, threatened, or endangered plant species and unique or exemplary natural communities. Our review involves examining maps, manual and computerized records, other sources of information such as scientific articles or published references, and the personal knowledge of staff or cooperating experts.

Our official response covers only botanical features. For authoritative information and official response for zoological features you must make a similar request to the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, 284 State Street, Augusta, Maine 04333.

According to the information currently in our Biological and Conservation Data System files, there are no rare botanical features documented specifically within the project area. Based on the information in our files and the landscape context of this project, there is a low probability that rare or significant botanical features occur at this project location.

This finding is available and appropriate for preparation and review of environmental assessments, but it is not a substitute for on-site surveys. Comprehensive field surveys do not exist for all natural areas in Maine, and in the absence of a specific field investigation, the Maine Natural Areas Program cannot provide a definitive statement on the presence or absence of unusual natural features at this site.

The Natural Areas Program is continuously working to achieve a more comprehensive database of exemplary natural features in Maine. We would appreciate the contribution of any information obtained should you decide to do field work. The Natural Areas Program welcomes coordination with individuals or organizations proposing environmental alteration, or conducting environmental assessments. If, however, data provided by the Natural Areas Program are to be published in any form, the Program should be informed at the outset and credited as the source.

Normandeau Associated submitted a request for consultation for information on historical and archaeological features within the Layover facility project area with the Maine Historic Preservation Commission (MHPC) in October 2011. The MHPC response, which we have attached, requested a review for buildings 50 years or older, either on or adjacent to the site, should be conducted from which the MHPC could continue their consultation. Normandeau conducted a review on January 23, 2012, which included a review of the Town of Brunswick files (assessors and code enforcement) to identify potential buildings and a brief windshield survey of the area. We did not find any structures over 50 years old adjacent to the proposed structure. The following is a summary of our findings. Figures are attached showing the proposed facility and the Town of Brunswick Zoning map for the parcel

The proposed Layover Facility is located on Maine Central Railroad property (Map U23 Lot 93 of the Town's zoning map, dated April 1, 2010), within the central portion of the lot. The lot has previously been used as a rail yard and has been cleared and graded. The following parcels are located immediately to the north and south of the proposed structure.

Map U23	Lots 20, 47, 50, 55A, 57A
Map U28	Lots 1A, 3, 7, 91, 93

The lots to the north of the proposed facility within Map U23 are a mix of commercial and residential dwellings. This area has been developed for at least 50 years along US Route 1 but it does not appear that any buildings currently abutting the proposed Layover Facility are over 50 years old. The oldest is the Salvation Army building at 127 Pleasant Street (Lot 47), which was built in 1969. A residential neighborhood is located to the south of the proposed facility with houses built in 1968 (estimated date, Lot 7) and the early 1970's. Lot 1A contains a new office building located at 35 Church Road, which was constructed in 2005.



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
DOWNEASTER BRUNSWICK STORAGE AND MAINTENANCE FACILITY **BRUNSWICK WEST SITE**

Thank you for the opportunity to review the above-referenced project for compliance with National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) requirements.

Based on the project description, we do not have knowledge of any specific sites or cultural features that exist at the proposed project location. However, this geographic area does constitute traditional areas that were historically utilized by members of the Aroostook Band of Micmacs and other northeaster Tribes. Therefore, we respectfully, request that if during the course of excavation/construction activities, human remains, artifacts, or any other evidence of Native American presence is discovered, that site activities in the vicinity of the discovery immediately cease, pending notification to us.

In addition, if this project results in wetland disturbances requiring mitigation, we are requesting that you utilize the black ash (<u>Fraginus nigra</u>) as the principle wetland species for wetland restoration activities. The black ash tree has special significance in the culture of the northeastern Tribes and is used extensively for weaving baskets and other Native American crafts. The black ash tree also provides valuable food and habitat for migratory waterfowl and other wildlife. Unfortunately however, this species has been selected against by foresters and landowners who favor other tree species. As a result of this, and other environmental factors, the black ash tree is in serious decline in Maine. The Aroostook Band of Micmacs has completed several black ash wetland restoration projects and we have a dependable source for highly-quality seedlings, and the experience and expertise to assist you with black ash wetland restoration projects.



On the subject of human remains, artifacts, or any other evidence of Native American presence is discovered. The human remains will be reburied with the appropriate respect for the remains that is required at a distinctive and respectable site. The artifacts and other evidence of Native American discovery will be documented with appropriate detail. The items will be analyzed for the precise period of the items distinctive period and will be documented by the Tribal Historic Preservation Officer from the Aroostook Band of Micmacs.

The Northern New England Passenger Rail Authority (NNEPRA), in cooperation with the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), is proposing to construct a passenger rail equipment layover facility in Brunswick, Maine to support expansion of the Amtrak *Downeaster* passenger rail service. The proposed facility will consist of a layover building and connecting tracks at the site of the Brunswick freight rail yard located between Church Road and Stanwood Street on property now owned by NNEPRA. The site of the proposed facility is located approximately 0.6 miles west of Brunswick Station, the eastern terminus of Amtrak Downeaster service. The layover building is intended to accommodate the overnight storage of a maximum of three (3) diesel locomotive- powered passenger train sets used for the Downeaster service. Approximate dimensions of the single story building are 655 feet long by 70 feet wide with a maximum height of 37 feet. Funding for the project is anticipated to include a combination of state and federal funds, potentially including state multi-modal and bond funds, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Improvement Program grant funds and American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) grant funds.

NNEPRA contracted NEPA document preparation to Parsons Brinckerhoff and their subconsultant, Normandeau Associates. Normandeau initiated Section 106 consultation with Maine Historic Preservation Commission (MHPC) by submitting a request for information on historical and archaeological features within the Layover Facility project area in October 2011. The MHPC response, which we have attached, requested a review for buildings 50 years or older, either on or adjacent to the site, Normandeau conducted a review on January 23, 2012, which included an examination of the Town of Brunswick files (assessors and code enforcement) to identify potential buildings and a windshield survey of the area. There

presently are no structures on the site and Normandeau did not find any structures 50 years or older adjacent to the site. Their report is attached.

Based on the historical rail use and lack of potentially significant historic structures in the immediate project area, we believe the project would have no effect on historic and archeological resources. In accordance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, we seek MHPC's review and determination that there would be no effect by the proposed project. If necessary, NNEPRA and our consultants would be happy to meet with you in your office to discuss this project.
